President's Report

After the constant presence of the impact of COVID-19 pandemic throughout the WA community in 2021, it was wonderful to see all the volleyball activities, programs and events start to return throughout 2022.

From an interstate perspective, other than our athletes and coaches selected to travel to the Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships it was pleasing to see all other Indoor State Teams were able to travel to their respective Championships and Leagues, Junior (U23) to Sydney, Youth (U15, U16, U17, U18) to Bendigo and Australian Volleyball League to the Gold Coast. In 2023, we look forward to all of our State Teams being able to travel again.

The challenges of managing the exponential growth of Volleyball in WA have placed additional pressures operationally and at Board level. The unbelievable commitment and professionalism of the Executive group and associated staffing team and my fellow Board members rising to tackle these very real challenges is noteworthy. Well-structured, forward-looking planning will be key to the sports success with the next cycle of the 2022 – 2025 Strategic Plan.

Strategic Risk subsets of the new Strategic Plan highlighted four high risk factors for the sport during this cycle:

Growth and Finance

Financial stress resulting from investment in growth outpacing revenue or inability to diversify revenue streams.

Places to Play

The Volleyball community has insufficient access to places to play to support the explosive growth of volleyball in Western Australia, leading to people being barred from participation.

• Key Role Reliance

Being reliant, upon the availability of one or a few key persons who have, critical (indispensable) and tacit knowledge (accumulated know-how) about our sport that cannot be easily found or replaced from the external labour market. Retaining employee, board, official / volunteers at all organisation levels of the sport.

• Natural Disaster or Pandemic / Endemic (COVID-19)

Financial impact on Volleyball WA due to COVID-19 (or similar) via government restrictions or economic restraints. Resource impact on Volleyball WA due to COVID-19 (or similar) via government restrictions on the health and well-being of individuals.

Given the importance of these identified Strategic Risks at each Board meeting one risk and the relevant focus areas and outcomes from the Strategic Plan are discussed. Further, the Volleyball staff teams have developed their Operational Plans and the 2023 budgets to align with and underpin the implementation of the Strategic Plan and manage the Strategic Risks identified.

Supporting key elements of the strategic plan the Volleyball WA Board identified further staff resources were required with three staff members to be engaged during the course of 2022 / 2023 initially. The staff

positions identified to be engaged in the short term include an Events Coordinator (Part-time), a Pathways Coach (Part-time) and a full-time Inclusion and Diversity Coordinator.

The engagement of these additional staff will likely see Volleyball WA operating at a financial loss in 2023. Investing in and funding growth is always a difficult process for up-and-coming sporting organisations of our size trying to transition to a mainstream sport of note.

In addition, the VWA Board reviewed the Terms of Reference for each of the VWA Committees and Working Groups and have created two new Board sub-committees. The Advocacy sub-committee was formed to assist with both the 'Growth and Finance', and 'Places to Play' Strategic Risks and will assist in continuing to build the profile of the sport particularly with the ongoing establishment of relationships with local (metropolitan and regional) and state government, and other key stakeholders. The Succession Planning / new Patron sub-committee was formed to assist with dealing with the 'Key Role Reliance' Strategic Risk, addressing and reviewing required skill's matrixes for a new Patron and for the appointment of key staff / election of Board members in the years ahead.

From a National perspective, it has also been very pleasing to see, after much hard work by many committed parties, the maturing of the relationships between Volleyball Australia and respective States / Territories toward securing agreements on issues of National significance that will benefit the sport across the country. Two significant areas have been agreed in principle between Volleyball Australia and the States / Territories for commencement in 2023.

• A National Participation Charter – due for commencement July 2023

The purpose of the Charter is to define roles and responsibilities across the Volleyball system in Australia, removing duplication and being more efficient and effective in working in the system. The key priorities for 2023 / 2024 include Facilities Strategy development, Education alignment and expansion, Participation Product re-design, Participation Framework and Strategy, National Digital alignment and a National Marketing strategy.

• Australian Volleyball Super League (AVSL) – August & September 2023

The AVSL will consist of six teams (per gender) and will be played in August and September 2023. The League will be designed to be shown on television and live-streamed professionally. The changes of dates for the League will mean that the VWA WAVL State League games will need to commence in April 2023.

A huge thanks as always to our invaluable, never taken for granted, major sponsors and partners the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries, Healthway and the Alcohol Think Again message, Fortix, Volleyball Australia, the WA Association for Mental Health, Star Physio and Diamond Fitness.

Congratulations to our 2022 Hall of Champions Dan Howard, Lisa MacNeill (nee Willcocks) and Laurel Wentworth, and Order of Merit recipient Alexander Sands.

From a VWA Board perspective, Mitchell Collins and Joanne Fitzpatrick resigned from the Board at the 2022 AGM – thank you to you both for your dedication, contribution and commitment to the VWA Board.



Welcome to Ruth Gibbons and Michelle Hort who all joined the VWA Board as Appointed Board members in 2022. Racharl Funch was appointed for another 12 months in June, 2022.

To my fellow volunteer Board members, the professional crew of Robyn and her staffing team who have made, as always, a huge contribution for the benefit of the sport in 2022, I thank you all. The sports success of course would not be possible without the rest of the volleyball community. My massive thanks to the committees, Presidents, and leaders of all our Associations, Clubs and Indoor Beach Volleyball Centres across this vast State of ours. Volleyball's huge growth and success in this State reflects the significant efforts from you all. To the wider volleyball community and volunteers in WA, I thank you again for your collective tireless commitment to this great sport.

Finally, a very large and heartfelt thank you to John McGrath (MLA) our long serving (2009 – 2022) VWA Patron, we have greatly appreciated your outstanding support and commitment to the sport of volleyball. We wish you all the very best in your retirement.

Chief Executive Officer's Report

2022, saw another busy year for Volleyball in Western Australia. At the commencement of the year COVID-19 continued to have some impact on the daily activities of the sport in Western Australia, and it was still having an impact on interstate travel particularly for our WA State Youth Beach Teams which meant that they were unable to once again travel for their National Championships. Western Australia was able to send all of our Indoor State teams to the remainder of the Indoor National Championships throughout the rest of the year.

A huge congratulations to all the athletes, coaches, referees and officials that attended the National Championships, and special recognition to the WA Steel Australian Volleyball League teams who came home with a silver (women) and bronze (men) medal.

The return to sporting and recreation activities bought different challenges in 2022 with a rapid growth of members and participants being experienced by many of our Clubs and Associations. The sport continued to see many examples of people continuing to work together to support each other and the entire community. Many of these stories are included in the Annual Report either in the sections of this report or in the Club and Association reports. Congratulations and thank you to all of our affiliated Clubs, Associations, Schools and Indoor Beach Volleyball Centres for all your ongoing work and dedication.

In 2022, Volleyball WA introduced the new 2022 – 2025 Strategic Plan. The following purpose, mission, values and strategic enablers were agreed for the new Strategic Plan;

Purpose

"To inspire healthy minds and bodies through volleyball".

Mission

To support Western Australian communities to play the world sport of volleyball in an inclusive and fun environment.

Values

Inclusivity and Accessibility, Health and Wellbeing, Community and Respect.

Strategic Enablers

Identify technology support systems to optimise sound foundations, open and inclusive communications, strong financial sustainability with continued growth, demonstrate excellent governance and leadership, effective collaboration, review of the VWA Committee structures.

As a result, the 2022 Annual Report has been compiled to reflect the four priorities and their new focus areas. The four focus areas include;

• Participation

Capture, engage and increase the number of volleyball participants.

Pathways

Provide development opportunities and support for the volleyball community.

Profile

Build the visibility of volleyball in Western Australia.

• Through People

Sustainable growth through engaged, empowered and connected people.

The majority of volleyball in WA saw significant growth and the ongoing development of new activities in many of our programs, activities and programs, highlights included;

- Continued growth in overall membership and participants (both Clubs and Individuals). *Total participation (including members) increased by 25, 931 individuals.*
- Continued growth of coach and referee accreditations.

 Growth of 238 new coach (18% increase) and referee (23% increase) accreditations.
- The ongoing development and roll-out of the volleyball programs for the Disabled and Aboriginal and Torres Islander.
 - Disabled participation increased by over 300 individuals and Aboriginal and Torres Islander by 763 individuals.
- Ongoing annual growth of the Volleyball WA Profile via website views and Social Media followers. Facebook and Instagram Followers for volleyball in Western Australia increased by over 59,900, and Volley Voice (e-Newsletter) to 11,516 subscribers (an increase of 2,258 subscribers).
- Growth of team entries into both WA Volleyball League and WA Junior Volleyball League. *Team Entries increased by 65 teams.*

Thank you to our extremely hard-working clubs, associations, schools, indoor beach volleyball centres and community groups for your ongoing support and commitment. To our numerous and highly skilled volunteers who attend the VWA Committee and Working Group meetings, we appreciate all that you have done.

To our 255 contract, casual and hobby / honorarium workers, we sincerely thank each of you for the role(s) that you undertake as Tournament Directors, Heads of Delegations, Set-up / Pack-down Crew, State Team and Development Squad Coaches, Clinic and Education Presenters and / or competition Chief Referees, Referees and Officials.

Thank you to all the VWA Board, the support, expertise, knowledge and extensive hours that each of you continued to undertake throughout 2022 was truly exceptional and I sincerely thank each of you for everything that you did for the organisation and for the sport.

To the entire VWA Staff team, who once again worked so incredibly hard throughout the year a massive and heartfelt thank you. In 2022, we saw the employment of a number of new staff members, Michelle Hilbrands (Discover Volleyball Coordinator – All Abilities), José Manuel Martinez (OLY) (Education Coordinator), Angelo Tancredi and Ella James (Reception and Facilities Officer – Angelo resigned in October), Kirsten Tyson (Club and People Development Coordinator), Weiwei Yuan (Financial Accountant) and Jason Laverdure who commenced his new role as the Community and Stakeholder Coordinator in October. In relation to resignations, Desiree Tan (Youth Pathways Coordinator) departed in September to take-up a Head Coaching position in Sweden and longstanding staff member Jacqueline Hunt



(Administration Support Coordinator) left in October, we thank each of them for their support and commitment.

Lastly, from a staffing perspective, Paula Johnstone (Finance and Administration Coordinator) retired in October 2022, after over seven years of service to Volleyball WA. We thank Paula for her outstanding commitment and support to Volleyball WA and wish her all the very best with her retirement.

On behalf of VWA, I also recognise and thank all our sponsors and stakeholders that have supported VWA throughout 2022. The ongoing support commitment and support provided by both the Department of Local Government, Sport and Culture (DLGSC) and Healthway is significant and is truly valued by both the VWA Board and Staff teams.

WA Board Governance Matters

The VWA Board, in accordance with the Associations Incorporated Act, 2015 and the VWA Constitution, ensures the proper, efficient, and effective performance of VWA.

As part of good corporate governance, the Board undertakes a review of its performance and its committees each year. This includes attendance at Board and subcommittee meetings and major Volleyball WA events. Annually, the Board reviews the quality and integrity of its strategic planning, policies, financial reporting, and risk management to be followed by Volleyball WA.

The Volleyball WA Board met on nine occasions during 2022 and considered several key items across all areas of the business, including:

- Development and approval of the 2023 Budget, 2023 Operational Plan and 2023 Calendar.
- Development and approval of the 2023 Staffing Structure including three new positions (two in March / April 2023 and one post July 2023).
- Review of all the Terms of Reference for each of the Volleyball WA Committees and Working Groups. Board members and the CEO attend many of these meetings.
- Development and approval of the 2022 2025 VWA Strategic Risk Report.
- Ongoing review of the VWA Strategic Plan 2022 2025 / Strategic Risk Report at each Volleyball WA Board meeting one priority / risk discussed at each meeting.
- Formation of the following Volleyball WA Board sub-committees;
 - Succession Planning and Patron
 - Advocacy planning to support the ongoing work for the organisation regarding 'Places to Play'
- Ongoing review of the 2023 Stakeholder Engagement, and Digital and Content Marketing Strategies.
- The ongoing review of Volleyball WA Policies and the Volleyball WA Policy Hierarchy, in conjunction with the directions being provided by Volleyball Australia and Sport Integrity Australia's National Integrity Framework.

- Annual review and updating of the Volleyball WA Board Skills Matrix.
- Annual review of the DLGSC Evaluation of the Volleyball WA Board.
- Oversight of the financial performance of the organisation to ensure both growth of the
 organisation and long-term sustainability, including the ongoing lease for the volleyball office and
 courts at West Perth with the City of Vincent.
- Ongoing upgrade of the technology systems (computers, telephone system and on-line meeting facilities).
- Compliance with Department of Local Government, Sport & Cultural Industries Gender Diversity Requirements (Funding).
- The CEO and President attended the Volleyball Australia AGM and Strategic Planning and Stakeholder meetings.

The impact of the COVID- 19 Pandemic on Volleyball WA

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to provide challenges for Volleyball WA early in 2022. Disruption to interstate and international travel continued to be key issues that Volleyball WA needed to respond to.

From a Volleyball WA perspective, the impact of COVID-19 resulted in the following:

Participation

Capture, engage and increase the number of volleyball participants.

Focus Area: Grow the volleyball participant base and establish expected growth targets.

Volleyball WA continued to grow the activities under the Discover Volleyball portfolio to engage and grow our diverse participant base in 2022 including the introduction of new Adaptive Volleyball (All Abilities and Senior Volley) activities and the inaugural Pride and Rotto Cup events. We continue to run multicultural activities and have started engaging more Aboriginal schools and organisations. We now have entry level points in our sport in WA from Kids (5+ years) through to Seniors 60+ years.

Multicultural

Volleyball WA continued to support multicultural communities throughout the year with their various events and activities where required. We continue to engage persons from CaLD communities and promote the diversity within our sport. In way of example, in just the WAVL State League and State League Reserves 34% of members were born overseas from 85 different countries of birth. This is reflective of the 32.2% (2021 Census) born overseas in the WA population.

Kids and Junior Volley

Kids and Junior Volley participant numbers continued to grow in 2022. Volleyball WA continued to work with Clubs, Associations and Affiliates to start new programs in new locations.

Kids and Junior Volley Camps

Volleyball WA held five school holiday participation camps in 2022. There were three indoor volleyball camps with a total of 191 participants and two beach volleyball camps with 59 participants. A total of 35 Kids and 215 Junior Volley participants. Balcatta VC and Southern Cross VC also ran indoor Kids (seven participants) and Junior Volley (139 participants) school holiday camps in 2022.

Adaptive Volleyball

- Sitting and All Abilities Volleyball
 - Volleyball WA established a pilot Sitting Volleyball Program at Melville LeisureFit thanks to support from the City of Melville. This program ran for six weeks through October and November. A \$5,000 Activate grant from the City of Melville was secured in December that will support the continuation of the Sitting Volleyball Program in Melville throughout 2023. Reds Volleyball Club continued to promote its All Abilities and Sitting Volleyball program during the year and Rossmoyne Volleyball club partnered with the Healthy Strides Foundation to run an All Abilities program.

- The Sitting Volleyball program in Rockingham delivered by Reclink WA Rocksportz has continued throughout 2022 with some minor disruptions due to funding.
- Volleyball WA continued working with Paralympics Australia to engage participants with disabilities. We participated in two Para-Sport: WA Multi-Sport 'Come & Try Days'. Volleyball WA was also the recipient of a \$2,062.50 Paralympics Australia Para-Sport Equipment Fund Grant enabling the purchase of five Sitting Volleyball Nets and adaptive volleyballs to be utilised across the volleyball community.
- Volleyball WA attended two Associated and Catholic Colleges of WA ("ACC") Multi Sport Inclusive Days, delivering sitting volleyball and adaptive standing volleyball to high school students that are living with a disability. We intend to launch an All-Abilities division in the 2023 WA Schools Cup.
- The WA Disabled Sport Association ("WADSA") presented a Disability Awareness and Inclusion in Sport workshop for eight participants for Volleyball WA in October, supported by Coaches and Officials grant funding from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries.

Senior Chair Volley

- Volleyball WA introduced a new adaption of volleyball for senior members of the community called Chair Volley. This game has two teams of six players seated in chairs playing across a smaller 4m net with a soft blow-up beach ball. The game focuses on fun, inclusion, and increasing the regular physical activity of people with limited mobility.
- Volleyball WA have had regular bookings at nursing homes (Karingal Green Health and Aged Care, Bridgewater Aged Care and Bethanie Aged Care) since June 2022 and attended the Seniors Recreation Council of WA 'Have a Go Day' at Burswood Foreshore on November 9 to showcase this new format of the game.

Rotto Cup

The development of the Rotto Cup was the first step in getting a permanent court on the island, a proof of concept of the popularity of the game. The inaugural event sold out in just three days, 96 players and their family and friends travelled to the island to compete in a men's and women's king and queen of the court style competition. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, and we are in ongoing talks about securing a permanent location for the court.

Pride Cup

Pride Cup was another new Social Volley event added to the calendar, held during Perth Pride Month at Gold Netball Centre, the initial registrations showing great opportunity for growth in 2023.

Fortix Corporate Cup

The Fortix Corporate Cup continues to grow and develop. In 2022 the event hosted at the Inner City Beach courts introduced a registration fee, and retained both naming rights sponsor Fortix and minor sponsor The Good Grocer Leederville. The event was won by Star Physio who defeated last year's winner the Department of Local Government, Sport, and Cultural Industries.

Australian Masters Games (AMG) 2022

The rescheduled AMG 2021 was run in April 2022 with only Beach Volleyball due to the reduced number of participants and the costs for indoor court hire. The uncertainty of travel and rules across the different states reduced the number of registrations across all sports. The beach volleyball events saw a final number of 66 teams and 92 people participating in the 4-day beach volleyball event: QLD-1, VIC-2, TAS-5, SA-2, NSW- 0, ACT- 0, WA- 82. Volleyball WA was involved in the handover of the AMG 2023 Games flag to South Australia.

School Volley

School Volley presented by Spikezone (Primary School Clinics)

VWA saw a drop in 'Sporting Schools' and primary school clinics in 2022 due to COVID-19 school restrictions. Volleyball is still in the top 10 sports chosen by primary schools in WA, with 48 schools registered to run Volleyball through 'Sporting Schools' (693 sessions with 5,333 participants). Sporting Schools will continue into 2023.

School Volley presented by Think Again (High School Clinics)

VWA received nine secondary school clinic bookings in 2022. These clinics were for WACE preparation, general PE studies and WA Schools Cup preparation. For the nine schools, VWA ran 51 sessions for 196 participants.

Regional School Clinics presented by Alcohol. Think Again Regional Programs

Volleyball WA also visited Christmas and Cocos Islands, Midwest, Kimberley and Goldfields regions in 2022 running a total of 67 sessions for 972 participants.

School Holiday Clinics

Volleyball WA delivered 13 clinics for 361 participants in school holiday programs at UWA and ECU throughout the school holidays in Terms #1, #2 and #3.

School Sport WA (SSWA)

School Sport managed to host the 2022 Champion Schools Volleyball Competitions for Junior and Senior schools with 301 teams in total. Country Week volleyball was the biggest sport in 2022 with 75 teams participating. The District High Schools Country Week was also run in September with eight mixed teams competing. Volleyball WA coordinated the second SSWA Teachers' Games in October with seven teams and the Port Kennedy Indoor Beach coordinated the beach volleyball event wth 14 teams.

Junior Beach Series

The competition had three separate rounds in 2022 from January to February. Round One was hosted by West Coast Beach Volleyball Club and featured 18 teams at Sand Sports North Beach. Round Two hosted by Reds Volleyball Club had 21 teams at Sand Sports Nedlands. AV Academy and Southern Cross Volleyball Club held Round Three at Cockburn CRC with five teams competing. A fourth round was scheduled to be hosted by The Hub but was cancelled due to COVID-19.

VWA School Competitions

In 2022 VWA provided the following school-based competitions.

- Think Again High School Beach Cup Term 1 (116 teams, a decrease of 19 teams affected by COVID-19)
- West Australian Senior Schools Cup August & Junior Schools Cup Term 3 (224 teams, a decrease of 35 teams also affected by COVID-19)
- Think Again High School Beach Cup Term 4 (138 teams, an increase of nine teams and bounce back following COVID-19)

Focus Area: Develop and implement a state-wide engagement plan for all current and new volleyball participants.

In 2022, Volleyball Australia and the State and Territory Members agreed to co-invest a total of \$3.2m over four years to grow participation nationally. The investment is supported by the new National Participation Plan 2025: Play Together, which draws out how Volleyball Australia will work towards supporting growth in the community. Volleyball WA will work with Volleyball Australia and the other States / Associations to develop the nationwide Participation Charter which will commence implementation from July, 2023.

Part of the investment will be directed towards building and refining SpikeZone, Volleyball Australia's entry-level volleyball program for kids aged between five and 13. The program will be developed into a more valuable junior competition model, similar to successful programs delivered by other major codes such as Cricket Blast, NetSetGo and HotShots.

Other strategic areas that will see increased investment will be community facilities access, e-learning, coaching, officiating, digital capability, with more focus also placed on integrity and child protection training.

Focus Area: Review and implement the places to play strategy with a focus on high growth local communities.

Volleyball WA's Places to Play Strategy was reviewed in 2022, an updated plan will be released in 2023. The high growth areas identified in the plan include Baldivis, Alkimos, Piara Waters, Brabham and Harrisdale. In way of examples as to the variery of work undertaken, Volleyball WA has been working with the City of Rockingham in the development of their new Baldivis Recreation Centre to include volleyball courts and programs. We have been working with Lend Lease on the Alkimos Estate Development which will include beach courts. We have consulted with Harrisdale Senior High School about the construction of their new



beach courts and have also been discussing with the City of Swan their redeveloped Midland Active Centre which will include more volleyball courts and programs.

In 2022, Volleyball WA continued building its engagement with Local Government authorities and venue operators. In addition to trying to find indoor venues for our growing competitions and training needs, Volleyball WA also started conversations with schools wanting to build inland beach volleyball facilities to respond to volleyball's increasing popularity at their school. Bowls clubs have also expressed an increasing interest in the conversion of underutilised greens to beach and grass volleyball courts to increase its offerings and diversify its membership.

Volleyball WA were fortunate to be selected as one of the sports to take part in a free trial of the ActiveXchange program through Sportwest. The ActiveXchange platform harnesses the collective data intelligence, and the power of data science, to help continue to build and encourage more active and healthy communities. The platform can produce heat maps of high growth and potential growth communities in the state. Volleyball WA will be able to use this information to inform decisions around the placement of programs and infrastructure needs.



Pathways

Provide development opportunities and support for the volleyball community.

Focus Area: Supporting the Clubs and Associations to build administrative capacity.

In 2022, Volleyball WA reviewed and updated its Club Development Plan to be implemented in 2023. The plan focuses on providing the tools and resources for clubs to build their administrative capacity and includes relevant workshops and upskilling opportunities.

Focus Area: Review mentoring and education programs for officials, referees, and coaches.

2022 was a year of many realisations in terms of education. Having a dedicated Education Coordinator made the education administration work more efficient, improved referee and coaches understanding of the qualification process, provided increased detailed data collection, and helped highlight educational gaps to better plan for the future.

We had the introduction of the new VA Accreditation Portal, revolutioniseSPORT, as Volleyball Australia's (VA) national hub for everything accreditation related. This has provided a single portal that included accreditation information and application forms for every level of referee and coach accreditation.

The VA Level #2 Coach Course evolved from a static, classroom-centred course to a workshop-style session. The course enables an exchange of ideas and provides a hands-on-approach to learning. The collaborative activities allow for the participants to share their thoughts while being provided with



feedback not only from the presenter, but from the other participants as well. Spending more time on-court also allows the participants to have a better feel of what they should be doing with their own players. This is a similar format to the three-day Level #3 Coach Course that took place in July. This course had been cancelled in previous years due to interstate travel restrictions (COVID-19) of the presenter and we were happy to finally have the opportunity to upskill some of our more experienced Level #2 coaches.

In 2022, we were able to offer some additional referee education. A referee forum was delivered for 12 participants before WAVL to provide a comprehensive look at expectations, rule changes, and misconceptions about refereeing overall. We also trialled a face-to-face session with a presenter for groups of participants taking a Level #1 Referee Course. This enabled inexperienced referees to gain additional information and the opportunity to have their questions answered by an expert.

Five Coach PD Forums were held with 195 participants. These included Champion's Bay Senior High School, Murdoch Univrsity, Australian Catholic College (RKAS), ATAR and ACHPER. A Referee PD Forum was held at Peter Cranley Anglican Community School with six participants.

A survey was circulated at the end of the year to coaches and referees asking for suggested improvements to the program. The survey results have been very useful towards planning for 2023, with the aim to provide more educational opportunities on top of the VA courses. The Referee Committee has also been very proactive at providing feedback and sharing what they believe are areas of opportunity to provide better mentorship and Referee education programs to our members.

Focus Area: Providing opportunities and ongoing implementation for the Talent Identification (TID) and High Performance (HP) athletes, coaches, and officials.

VWA High Performance Review Group (HPRG)

In 2022, the Volleyball WA HPRG continued their work to assist the ongoing development of the volleyball pathway and FTEM Model.

Discussions with VenuesWest, WAIS and Volleyball Australia progressed throughout the year. Volleyball was assessed as a "performing" sport (one of 18) and was named a VenuesWest targeted sport through to 2025/2026. With this, VWA receives support such as subsidies and priority access to venue hire for all VenuesWest facilities, and assistance with developing bids to bring major sporting events to Perth.

The WAIS 2022-2032 Strategic Plan was released. The plan calls for WAIS to increase its support of the sport performance pathways to scholarship programs with the intent to grow the number of sport programs WAIS can support as well as enhance current sport program scholarship numbers. The 2024-26 target is for an additional three sport programs, and Volleyball is one of the three sports on the priority list for consultation.

The HPRG discussed in detail the key priorities in the development of a VWA Academy and the appointment of a full-time VWA Pathways Coach within the next year, acknowledging that we have reached volunteer capacity in this area. They also reviewed the current State Team Programs and Talent Identification Development (TID) opportunities and discussed ways to continue to improve.

Volleyball WA thanks all members of the VWA HPRG for their assistance in providing direction for TID and State Team program activities in Western Australia.

Beach and Indoor Preseason Programs

Asian Engagement

As part of the State Government's Asian Engagement Strategy; strengthening communities through sporting opportunities between Asia and Western Australia, Volleyball WA continued to collaborate with East Java at the start of 2022.

After the conclusion of the PON Games in early October 2021, where the East Java Women's Volleyball Team finished second place, VWA commenced a new underpinning project at the request of KONI JATIM. This involved creating a manual of WA Volleyball strategies and systems, with supporting videos filmed by the Women's WA Steel team, that we could share with East Java to serve as a guide for the team continuing the work that began just five months prior to the PON Games. This project was led by coaches Rory Read and Gareth Whitehead and was completed by the middle of 2022.

VWA investigated the feasibility for a Women's Four Nations event in 2022 with teams from our partners in East Java and the Philippines, as well as potential teams from Thailand or Vietnam to compete against the WA Steel Women. Unfortunately due to lack of sufficient funding this event was not feasible, and planning was postponed to the following year.

Alcohol. Think Again Beach Volleyball Tour

The 2022 VWA Annual Report covers two seasons (21/22 and 22/23) with events played between January - April and in November and December 2022. Eight tour events were held in total across the two seasons, located at City Beach, Scarborough, Trigg, Sorrento and Regional Volleyball Centres in Bunbury and Mandurah.

Hosting of the Alcohol. Think Again Beach Tour events in regional centres of Western Australia is always a highlight in the season's calendar. VWA would like to thank Bunbury Volleyball Association and Mandurah Volleyball Association for their outstanding support and commitment to these events. We were able to secure a two-year funding agreement with the City of Bunbury which enabled local press to be involved with radio interviews.

The tour maintained its major partnership with Healthway promoting the Alcohol. Think Again message, our sincere thanks to Healthway. The season was also supported by the Town of Cambridge, City of Stirling, City of Mandurah, City of Bunbury, City of Joondalup, Kennards Hire and the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries.

WA Volleyball League (WAVL)

WAVL 2022 ran as planned unaffected by COVID-19. 130 teams competed in the 2022 season, an increase of 24 teams. WA Volleyball Junior League (Indoor)

As the previous table indicates, in 2022, VWA conducted the WA Volleyball Junior League with 148 teams, an increase of 41 teams from 2021 meaning it was the largest Junior League season run to date. Thank you to the many clubs and schools that entered teams in WA Volleyball Junior League and made sure our juniors were able to play their sport of choice.

VWA State Championships

The 2022 Indoor Alcohol. Think Again WA State Championships were held in September at Bendat Basketball Centre. VWA would like to thank the Regional Volleyball Associations who participated in this event: Albany Volleyball Association, Bunbury Volleyball Association, Busselton Volleyball Association, Esperance Volleyball Association, Kalgoorlie Volleyball Association, Mandurah Volleyball Association and Northwest Volleyball Association. The 2022 Alcohol. Think Again Beach State Open was held in February at Scarborough Beach with a total of 86 teams.

UniSport Nationals 2022

The UniSport Nationals was held in Perth in 2022 with Volleyball WA assisting with running both the beach and indoor events. Beach Volleyball was run at City Beach from September 24 – 27, with 17 Men's, nine Women's and 10 Mixed Fours teams competing. Indoor volleyball was run between HBF Stadium (Mt Claremont), Bendat Basketball Arena and Curtin Stadium from September 24-30. 16 Men's and 18 Women's teams competed from universities across Australia.

Profile

Build the visibility of volleyball in Western Australia.

Focus Area: Promote active recreation, health and wellbeing benefits of the volleyball experience.

Volleyball WA continued to promote active recreation through the hosting and marketing of its annual calendar of events. We published articles on the latest Ausplay and other data on sports participation, the effects of COVID-19 on structured sport and the increasing community desire for unstructured, "active recreation" and how Volleyball is able to cater for and adapt to changing community needs.

We continued our Stories of Change series which highlights our successes and levelled up to publish more stories on our core values including health and wellbeing. Some of the topics covered in 2022 related to mental health, gender equality, inclusion, stress reduction, physical and mental benefits of sport, for kids, teens and seniors.

Focus Area: Maintain and develop meaningful engagement with current and new sponsors and stakeholders.

Volleyball WA's relationship with Healthway continued to grow including the appointment of four Alcohol, Think Again ambassadors who each received media training and were introduced to the community through a specially created video. Volleyball WA would like to thank our ambassadors, Shelby Maher, Jasmine Serra, Will Dundas and Kirrill Butler. Volleyball WA also received some additional funding towards a number of mental health initiatives. A plan was developed to be implemented in 2023.

Focus Area: Develop and implement a digital and content marketing strategy.

The Digital and Content Marketing Strategy is an internal document providing direction and focus for the organisations resources prioritising channels and detailing specific messaging.

Website and Social Media

VWA has continued to prioritise its digital platforms to engage and communicate with its stakeholders. Over the year we published more than one hundred stories, celebrating our athletes, clubs, and events. Volleyball WA's website proved its value as a communication tool with 252,276 page views. The growth in Facebook and Instagram continues at levels to suggest that resources are being well directed. As a total footprint for the sport in WA, our combined volleyball community on Facebook was over 244, 500 and on Instagram over 62,500. LinkedIn experienced good growth of just over 70%. The newly established TIKTOK account has 11,000 followers, with several posts going viral, one with 7.9m views.



Discover Volleyball continues to attract significant page views (17,133) particularly the Kids and Junior Volley pages. In 2022, Volleyball WA increased the communication with non-competitive players in our community, refreshing the Social Volley page and developing some new content about how the sport is adapting to provide opportunities in our community for people with intellectual and physical disabilities.

Focus Area: Review the communications and stakeholder engagement strategy.

The review of this document was completed and a new one was developed to align to the new Strategic Plan 2022-205. The review revealed the success of and reliance of digital marketing for the organisation and so a separate document was developed to highlight the importance of this communication method.

Communication Pieces

In 2022, we developed a written and video piece about Women in Volleyball launched on International Women's Day, March 8. The featured women included Pauline Manser, Maurice Marcelo, Shelby Mayer, Tara Banks, Renae Harvey and Alex Moir. The video reached 9,145 people across Facebook, LinkedIn, volleyballwa.com.au and YouTube. The book reached 7,611 people across Facebook, LinkedIn and volleyballwa.com.au.

Volleyball WA also updated it's Stories of Change document to reflect the new values of the sport and highlight the stories written and published during 2022.

Marketing Projects

VolleyMates was successfully launched in October 2022 with the support of the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries Innovation Challenge Grant. Early results ending December 2022 included 246 bookings and an estimated 2,538 players using our public open spaces.

In 2022 we reintroduced the WA Steel to Perth, following a break from national competition due to COVID-19. We introduced a fan membership to directly engage with supporters. We ran a series of athlete profiles to build awareness and inspire the next generation. Game day activations included an opportunity to get player autographs and live streaming increased the spectator numbers of the games.

Focus Area: Establish personal development pathways and health and wellbeing programs for staff and volunteers.

Staff Education

VWA staff continue to have a 'Taste of Harmony' monthly lunch as part of our cultural awareness education and a gold coin donation is collected for charity. The 2022 VWA staff donations went to the United Volleyball Club Pass the Volley initiative. All VWA Staff are required to complete the Diverse WA Cultural Competency Training Course and in 2022 VWA also required staff to complete the Public Sector Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Cultural Awareness Course.

The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries continued to support the sport by offering and promoting a range of courses to staff - these included governance, leadership, risk management, volunteer management and administration.

Community Education

2022 saw a notable increase of participation in the annual education program. Volleyball Australia's new accreditation portal, RevolutioniseSPORT, provided a home for all accreditation information. Our members can now purchase and complete their online Level #1 Referee and Coach Courses, sign up and complete Level #2 Courses, and do renewals on the same web-platform.

The total number of accredited coaches and referees continued the upward trend, with Referee numbers the highest in four years. 2022 closed with 834 accredited referees, an increase of 23% from the previous year. Coach numbers are also the highest they have been in at least five years, with a total of 530 accredited coaches, an increase of 18%. A total of 443 and 183 participants completed the online Level #1 Referee and Coach courses respectively.

Both the total number of Level #2 Courses and course participants saw an increase. A total of 16 Level #2 Courses were held with a total of 149 attendants throughout the year, a participation increase of 30%. These courses were organised by both VWA, and individual clubs assisted by VWA, helping with the upskilling of the state's referees and coaches. Additionally, the long-awaited Level #3 Coach Course was finally held in July. A total of 10 participants from various clubs learnt from the experienced Mick Nelson, who flew interstate to upskill some of our most experienced coaches.

Volleyball WA continued to expand the Regional Education program with the delivery of Accredited courses and workshops. A Level #2 Referee Course was held at the Indoor Beach Volleyball Centre in Port Kennedy in May and was attended by seven Mandurah and one Bunbury based referees. Seven students from Christmas Island participated in the Level #1 Online Referee Course and two practical sessions were run during our visit in February. Volleyball WA provided mentoring support to three Aboriginal coaches in the Geraldton Sporting Aboriginal Corporation. These coaches participated in the Level #1 Online Course and then were run through a practical session. In 2022 we also received Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries Active Regional Communities funding to support the delivery of additional



education courses and workshops in The Great Southern and Pilbara which will be delivered in the first half of 2023.

The Referee Committee remains as a strong and committed force that aims to improve not only the officiating, but the quality of every aspect of our sport in the state. Alongside with our course presenters, we value everyone involved and appreciate them giving some of their time to give back to our community.

Volleyball WA also received a \$13,000 the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries grant for Inclusion Education to focus on Aboriginal and Disability education of Coaches, Officials and Administrators. These are two areas we want to grow in our sport, and we believe that education of our community is the first step in changing our understanding and sport programming. VWA partnered with WA Disability Sports Association (WADSA) and Moodjar Consulting to deliver two workshop sessions each. One Disability Awareness Workshop was run in October and the second along with the Aboriginal Cultural Awareness sessions will be run in 2023.

Teacher Professional Development (Teacher PD)

We continue to build relationships with schools and school associations to be able to reach and educate more teachers so that volleyball can be the sport of choice in schools. Volleyball WA expanded the Teacher PD offerings in 2022. Thirteen Teacher PD courses were hosted in 2022 with 191 participants attending the courses. These Teacher PDs included one regional session in the Mid West in May for nine participants. A PD was scheduled in Broome in June but was cancelled as there were issues with COVID-19 and lack of relief teachers. Volleyball WA also engaged Rory Read from Rossmoyne Senior High School to develop an ATAR specific Teacher PD Workshop with a Resource Booklet. The first ATAR workshop was piloted in November 2022 with 22 teachers and two more are scheduled for 2023.

Volleyball WA also delivered a referee forum for teachers in the RKAS cluster of the Associated and Catholic Colleges of WA to upskill them to officiate their internal cluster tournaments. Five teachers completed the Level #1 Coaching Course online and then attended a forum presented by Danielle Francis. This complemented the online learning and was the perfect opportunity for teachers to ask any questions.

Volleyball WA also attended the ACHPER Conference in November at ECU Mount Lawley with great success, 13 Primary School teachers and 38 Secondary teachers got a free 50-minute taster of our Primary and Secondary School PDs respectively.

Clubs Conference

The 2022 AGM and Club Conference were held at sport sponsor venue, the Metro Hotel Perth on May 21, 38 people attended, from 21 clubs, associations, and the Indoor Beach Volleyball Federation.

With the new four-year strategic plan launched, the conference provided an opportunity for attendees to gain a greater understanding of the priorities for the year and the participation and engagement planning process. Guest speakers presented on grant writing, mental health, specialist physiotherapy, media and KidsSports. Thank you to all the participants who attended the conference and engaged in the discussions.



Employment of Regional Development Coordinators

Following the successful completion of the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries 2021/2022 Regional Servicing Plan documentation, VWA was able to continue the employment of Brad Barclay for four days per week in the Peel and South West regions. This has ensured the ongoing support to the growth of these regional volleyball activities. VWA also advertised for a new Regional Development Coordinator in the Mid West to expand our paid workforce. There were no suitable applicants at the end of 2022.

Gender Diversity

Volleyball WA prides itself on leading the way in gender diversity. In 2022, there were five females represented (of nine positions available) on the VWA Board and a 60% female / 40% male ratio in the VWA staff.

The Minister of Sport and Recreation and the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries confirmed the requirement for all State Sporting Associations to have 50% representation of males and females on their Management Boards by mid-2022, VWA is currently compliant with this Department funding requirement.

Good Sports (Healthway)

Good Sports is Australia's largest and longest-running health initiative in community sports. The program provides resources and support to clubs to create healthier and safer environments. The areas that are covered include responsible alcohol consumption, safe transport, illegal drugs, mental health, and nutrition. The program can help clubs to increase sponsorship, model good behaviour for younger club members and create a more sustainable business model.

In July 2022, Volleyball WA achieved their Gold Medal Good Sports Accreditation. Volleyball WA highly encourages all affiliates to work through the Good Sports program and achieve accreditation.

Focus Area: Continue to strengthen alignment between all volleyball participants and external stakeholders.

Volleyball WA's Community and Stakeholder Engagement Coordinator continued to develop and expand collaborative opportunities with venue and facility operators and owners during 2022.

VWA Public Open Spaces

Volleyball WA with the assistance of the Department of Local Government Sports and Cultural Industries, developed an innovative project called VolleyMates to allow hirers to access equipment instantaneously. Volleyball WA started with two locations initially, City Beach and Novelli Reserve and added Scarborough Beach shortly after. The project started in October 2022, and until December 2022, 246 bookings were made using the app with an estimated 2,538 players using our public open spaces. Volleyball WA is now holding conversations to increase the number of locations.

VWA, Regional Associations and LGA's have also maintained the number of public beach/park courts available in their respective areas. The location of the posts are as follows, Albany (4 courts), Bunbury (13 courts), Busselton (6 courts), Cottesloe (2 courts), City Beach (8 courts), Floreat Beach (2 courts), Scarborough Beach (4 courts), Piara Waters (1 court), Ellenbrook (1 court), and Naroona Park (1 court). We recorded an estimated usage of 60,400 participants in 2022 on these courts.

VWA continues hiring grass and beach kits to the public, with approximately 144 participants playing volleyball using our equipment in 2022. This equipment was used in public open spaces around Perth. As part of the Discover Volley program, we also sell Backyard and Pool Kits. In 2022 we sold ten Backyard Kits (60 participants) and four Pool Kits (16 participants).

VWA Beach Court Facilities – Inner City Beach and Cockburn CRC

The Hub Beach Volleyball Club has renewed their agreement to be primary users with Volleyball WA. Similarly, Southern Cross Volleyball Club remained a primary user at Cockburn CRC. The two clubs continued their work to offer opportunities for individuals to train and play volleyball at the two venues. In addition, VWA continues to use both venues for junior development and State Team programs, along with facilitating the booking of these courts for external hirers through the VolleyMates app.

Lead Volley Panel presented by Think Again

The Lead Volley Panel (LVP) program is supported by Healthway as part of its drive to build the capacity of our sport. The LVP in 2022 has undergone a review with the following outcomes:

- To open the program to a larger audience.
- The program structure needs to include more defined activities, these should be outcome/experience based.
- Members should work towards achieving positive contributions to their club.

In 2023, the Lead Volley Panel will be transformed into the Lead Volley Youth Network (LVYN). By encouraging youth participation and capacity building, Volleyball WA will promote its purpose to inspire healthy minds and bodies through volleyball. VWA recognises that many young people are involved in the sport as coaches, referees, or administrators, and it is crucial to assist and encourage them as they develop professionally and personally, just as we do for our players.

KidSport (DLGSC)

KidSport enables eligible Western Australian children aged 5 to 18 years with a valid Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card to participate in community sport by offering them financial assistance of up to \$150 per calendar year towards club fees. Clubs and Associations must be registered with KidSport to permit a child to use their Kidsport voucher.

Volleyball WA continued to expand the Regional Education Program with in person visits to the Christmas and Cocos (Keeling) Islands (January), Mid-West (May), Kimberley (June) and Goldfields (June). These visits were funded through Healthway, Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries Regional Servicing Funding and the Australian Government. Our Regional Development Coordinator in Peel and South West, Brad Barclay, continues to support the Regional Education in his regions.

Platinum, Platinum Regional and Gold VWA Affiliates

Albany Volleyball Association Inc.

The 2022 Albany Volleyball Association (AVA) Indoor Season began in May once again.

The season attracted 34 teams in total including the following registrations:

- Six Competitive Mixed Teams
- Seven Social Mixed Teams
- Eight Premier Mens Teams (Including Denmark)
- Six Premier Womens Teams

The team numbers were the same as last year but there was an increase in Junior numbers. The Finals Series in September went well. New Junior teams and new Social Mixed teams featured in the finals. The top teams in Competitive Mixed met and had a very tight tussle. In the Men's Premier League, GSG Gryphons came through from 3rd place to defeat Denmark in the preliminary and the Pirates in the Grand Final (five sets) for the first time in our history. In the Women's Premier League the Pirates Women won their match in three sets but their opponents Phantoms Women had fought through from 4th place to see them in the Grand Final. MVP for Competitive Mixed: Joe Elliss, Mens Prem: Rob Perisic, Womens Prem: Rachel Crowhurst. (All three were closely contested, Juniors/Social has an MVP for the Grand Finals only)

As Countryweek was still in question at the time of registrations the regional Schools did not all enter. Countryweek did happen but it was a delayed event that was held in Mid term # 3, rather than at the end of Term # 2.

The delayed AGM was held in early August. At the AGM we were short on nominations but the Executive Committee returned and further members were found to fill out the rest of the positions within the week. President: Joel Campbell, Vice President: Jack Sellenger, Secretary: Danielle Hopkins, Treasurer: Scott Leary, Dylan Black, Zac Clapp, Peran Durrant, Nienke Tempelman, Fiona Lionetti and Junior Member Logan Lionetti.

No regular AVA training sessions were held until selections for the State Champs occurred in July. The women also managed to get a team together for Collie Coal Cup 2022.

The Regional State Championships had become of more interest since 2021. From July to September, two Men's teams and two Women's teams were selected and trained to compete. The training times and locations were different for the two groups and self-funded. The Women's A team made it to the Semifinals, both Men's teams just missed out on berths and the Women's B team (mostly juniors) finished at the bottom of the league although they did have a win. This developed more interest for 2023 in State Champs and potentially the Mandurah, pre-season tournament. Nienke Tempelman won the best player for the Women's A League.

The Club did have a minor financial loss due to players' fees not being paid. This glitch is related to the Gameday software but we plan to close these gaps in the 2023 season.

Beach Volleyball 2022/23

Zac Clapp from our beach committee reported how good it was to be down at the beach again and to see the passion for beach volleyball hasn't faded. With a good crew eager to jump on the sand and have a go, bring on the next season of beach volleyball to grow it even more.

Social Beach went ahead this year, and three courts were full most Thursday evenings. The City of Albany did clean the beach but, on fewer occasions than we'd hoped. The beach courts were used many weekends too. Denmark developed their beach courts this year too and many Albany players have participated in their drop-in sessions.

VWA offered us a State League (ATABT) event for the March 2023 long weekend and we did all we could to accommodate this. Unfortunately, at the beginning of February, the City of Albany had to reject the event as they couldn't supply the number of courts requested. The event went to Busselton where eight courts were in use.

Off-Season Indoor 2023

Many of our players visited Denmark on Wednesday nights to play and train. The State Women continued training off-season in preparation for the Mandurah Tournament. It is expected one Women's and one Men's team will attend.

Preview of 2023 Indoor

40 teams have registered for the largest season we're expecting in over a decade. Due to court number restrictions we've had to put two teams on a wait list if anyone pulls out or more courts become available.

With winter looming a core group of Denmark volleyball tragics formed and became the first Denmark team in the Albany Mens Premier Division competition, albeit with one Albanian, and 1 woman. Nevertheless, one of the club goals had now been accomplished so it was clearly time to incorporate.

Officially a club, our next goal was to establish a club 'home'. The Denmark Recreation Centre, the only venue capable of hosting indoor volleyball was unfortunately fully booked and had no room for us. The caravan park, which very generously allowed us to use their court at no cost, despite us not being guests, was deemed unsuitable and all of the amazing beaches we had access to were all a little too far out of town. We then spotted a small wind-protected patch of grass in the sporting precinct which would be perfect. We pitched to the Denmark Shire (including plans and a budget) the idea of a new beach volleyball court at this location. Serendipitously, the shire was already looking to activate this unused area and in their 2022/23 budget allocated \$30,000 for the construction of a beach volleyball court and a new pump track. Given all the labour would be free and assuming we would have access to half of the allocated funds, we figured we may as well build two courts instead of one.

Court construction started in November and was completed in February of this year. I need to acknowledge the Shire of Denmark first and foremost for being so open to our vision and granting us the financial ability to build the courts. The courts wouldn't have been built without the support of the many local businesses who provided their time and/or equipment for free or at discounted rates. A very special thank you needs to be extended to the DVC committee as well as Albany players- Zac Clapp, McKinnon Barrett and Logan Lionetti, who donated their time as labourers on the project.

Alongside court construction, DVC has also been busy running social beach and indoor drop-in sessions, coaching students at the Denmark College of Agriculture, and fundraising for equipment.

Although we have a small town with few players our future is looking bright. Our focus now is to slowly grow our player base by providing social volleyball playing opportunities year-round, whether it be beach or indoor. Murdoch Volleyball Club

At Murdoch University Volleyball Club (MUVC), we tend to do things a little differently... Since its new leadership team commenced their term in 2022, MUVC's focus has been on improving player experience within the sport of volleyball, breaking down financial barriers to participation, and putting its member's needs and wellbeing above all else. Despite MUVC's tenuous financial state post-2021, MUVC financially invested in providing low socio-economic students at Gilmore College with better access to training facilities, coaching, refereeing opportunities, and free or heavily discounted matches with MUVC club members or other volleyball clubs or schools within the community.

In 2022, MUVC had seven teams enter into the WAVL competition (five men's teams and two ladies'), with approximately five active committee members, 10 coaches and 80 members in total. This coming year, in 2023, MUVC has expanded its coaching roster to a total of 18 coaches, now including two internationally accredited Level #3 Coaches, Emanuele Nagliati and Laura Mocca, who have taken the helm and will continue to mentor and upskill MUVC's other coaches.

During the 2023 trial period, MUVC saw over 200 athletes participate in try-outs and is now expecting to field up to 14 WAVL teams (nine men's teams and five ladies' teams), and as promised, achieved the requirements to qualify for the State League and State League Reserve competitions. Moreover, MUVC's



new partnership with Gilmore College will see all five of their WAVJL teams compete under the MUVC banner, as well as at least another three or four WAVJL teams, including or in addition to a further two WAVJL teams based out of St Hilda's Anglican School for Girls. This will potentially bring MUVC's total number of nominated teams up from seven in 2022, to around 25 in 2023!

MUVC has also been instrumental in assisting Murdoch University with its recruitment and training of athletes for the Western Invitational, Western Series, and UniSport Nationals events. In 2022, Murdoch University entered a total of eight teams across 32 different sports; five out of these eight teams had been organised by MUVC and included men's and ladies' beach volleyball pairs, mixed fours (beach volleyball), and men's and ladies' volleyball. MUVC has developed a strong relationship with Murdoch Active (the Murdoch University sports centre), whereby current MUVC members are entitled to participate in heavily discounted fitness testing programs and gym memberships to improve their athletic abilities.

We are most proud of what we have been able to achieve in just one short year, and we look forward to continuing our successes into 2023 and beyond. As MUVC's President since 2022, I would like to thank all past and current MUVC members, committee members, and coaches, for choosing to join our family, and helping to grow MUVC into the inclusive and nurturing club that it has become. I would also like to extend a special thank you to Laura Tan, MUVC's Vice-President in 2022, and now Secretary in 2023. Without Laura's dedication and commitment, MUVC would not be in the strong position it finds itself in today; she is both a strong leader and an invaluable member of the volleyball community - and a person of which I am most blessed to have as one of my closest friends. Northern Stars Volleyball Club

2022 has been a year of change for Northern Stars. As the next generation of Stars members, begin to take more senior roles within the club. After the last couple of years of player growth, the club has switched to the development of internal resources.

The committee has gone through major changes since 2021, with the President, Secretary and Treasurer all stepping down having done a fantastic job through the COVID-19 period of the last two years. Both the role of Secretary and Treasurer have been taken on by brand-new committee members. The club has also seen a wave of new members join the ranks of the committee. For the first time since the founding of the club, the committee is made up of a majority of new committee members. The energy that our new committee members have bought has been put to good use. In the background, the club has implemented a digital registration process. This process has allowed the time saved to be put to good use.

The club began the implementation of a long-term strategic plan that is designed to guide the long-term development of the club for the next decade. The long-term strategic plan covers areas of player growth, volunteer development and club structure.



The new committee was challenged weeks from forming when a couple of our members caught COVID-19 during our trial period at the start of the season. This caused the shutdown of our trials with one hour's notice to one of the trial groups. In a sign of how effective the committee is at working in a crisis, the club was able to cancel, notify and reschedule all affected trials the night that we received the unfortunate news. As President and leader of the club, I could not be prouder of how the committee worked through all the issues. It also showed that the club's spirit is as strong as ever with all of our members new and old.

The club has suffered a great lost with the loss of Prendiville Catholic College as our primary training venue due to a structural problem with the roof that was made worst with the first major storm of the year. Prendiville has been at the heart of the club since its founding, and the loss of Prendiville Catholic College as a training venue has been like losing our home. For many, Prendiville Catholic College has been the home of Northern Stars and it is with hope that the issues with the roof can be rectified, and we can return in the near future.

In recent years the club has gone through major growth, especially in our men's division playing stock. 2022 has seen a stabilizing of these numbers. To improve player development, the club made the decision the introduce two trainings per week for all division teams in line with the State League. While this has seen an increase in the quality of our players, this has put a large workload on all our coaches with some doing four nights per week as they also train with their own team. I would like to thank all our coaches for the huge effort that they have put in this season.

State League saw the return of some old faces to the club. As the defending champions the boys performed well making finals and finishing 4th. We hosted two home rounds this season. The first home round saw the club return to Warwick for the first time since before the pandemic against UWA. Our second home round against ECU was moved to ECU Mt Lawley due to a conflict with a national tournament. I wish to say thank you to ECU Chequers for their assistance in moving the home round. This home round marked the first WAVL game to be live-streamed with live commentary. This was a big effort to do, and I wish to say thank you to all involved.

Our State League Reserve's team had a long and hard 2022 that ended the season with the team being hosted by Busselton for the last game of the season. While results on the court may have not been what the team wanted, they did finish a respectable 6th for the season.

The Women's Divisions program continues its rebuilding program. We have seen new players enter the club and have retained most of our lower-division players from 2021. While our division 1 team might have been knocked out in grading, the team grew and developed, making it to the finals. The first women's team to do so since 2018, a sign of how our women's program is growing. Three of the four women's teams won more games in their own individual seasons than the entire women's program in 2021. From this platform, the club is hoping to grow our women's program as we aim to return the women to the State League.

The division men have seen some great progress in 2022. The Division 1 men successfully got through grading for the first time in three seasons. This was followed by our Division 2 and 3 men's teams also making it through grading. Our men's teams saw two teams make finals, Division 6 in 4th place and Division 2 making the Grand Final. Some of our Division Teams were hosted in home rounds for the first



time. Division 1 was hosted by Murdoch, with the Division 2 women. The Division 2 men were hosted by Busselton and Mandurah hosted the Division 2 Men and Division 3 Women. A big thank you to Murdoch, Mandurah and Busselton for hosting our Division Teams and I hope that this will be the first of many for our Division Teams over the next few seasons.

The junior teams continue to see growth in the boy's side with multiple entries in the 11/12 boys, two teams, and in the 9/10 boys, three teams. This is a strong indicator that the future of the men's program for the club is looking very positive. Unfortunately, the club only has three girls' teams. This shows that the growth of volleyball is uneven. While there may be more schools that now provide volleyball to their students, the big question that will need to be answered is why there are so few girl's teams from outside of the all-girls schools. This is an area that will need to be looked at in detail by the whole of the volleyball community. The effect can be seen currently with the standard of competition in the State League women. Unlike the men's, where the standard of competition is relatively even, the women's competition currently has large gaps in the standard of play that if left unchecked will damage the women's game and we as a sport will lose more female players to other sports.

It is with great anticipation and excitement that I am looking forward to the 2023 season and beyond. The setbacks that we have had this season have made us a stronger club. It is this strength that will carry the club forward to a bright future.

Southern Cross Volleyball Club

2022 saw further growth within the year, capitalising on the 2021 shift in strategy as more volleyball opportunities were offered to the public. Kids Volley and Junior Volley programs continued to expand whilst Junior Talent development programs were introduced, allowing WAVJL participants an avenue to develop their skills further, outside of the typical season offers. We finished the year with a total of 819 members up from 554 in 2021.

Kids and junior volley programs continue to be strong for the club in 2022, we had 159 kids volley participants (up from 85 in 2021) and 439 junior volley participants (up from 303 in 2012).

The collaborative Indoor Beach programs have always struggled with numbers; however, Term #4 saw a major growth in our Port Kennedy and Canning Vale Indoor beach programs and maintains a healthy number of participants in Term #1. We also saw the launch of a program with Fremantle Indoor Beach, the Junior program has started strong and maintains a strong number of participants for its first term. Ossie Park was one of the strongest and most consistent Indoor beach programs but has been declining since Term #3 2022 with Kids for Term #1 being cancelled and Junior registrations falling. This program will be a focus for promotion in Term #2.

The elite program in collaboration with ECU/AVA has seen a drop in numbers for U15 boys, but growth in U15/U18 Girls. This is partially due to changes in training days and the approaching Junior League/WAVL. There needs to be a push from coaches across the programs and within the Junior League to promote this program.

The biggest roadblocks to program consistency and expansion have been coach availability/reliability and community outreach for the promotion of programs. Currently, plans are being put together to develop marketing and promotional material as well as distribution locations.

2023 is expected to level out regarding the number of members in the WAVL and WAVJL segments due to a number of members leaving the club for the newly formed Apex Volleyball Club. Membership numbers are expected to reduce further through the creation of the Southern Cross Masters Volleyball Club which, whilst associated with SCVC, will have its own entity and therefore



individual numbers. Member satisfaction however is expected to increase as more experienced players will be able to compete in higher divisions without affecting SCVC's vision to create opportunities for developing juniors to progress through teams within the WAVL/SL divisions.

SCVC Mens having insufficient depth to field a competitive State League Team, combined with a large drop-off of numbers for SX South will result in the club losing its presence at Providence Christian College in Southern River.

The focus for the 2023 programs will be to continue to consolidate operations and seek new profitable ventures to allow the club to increase its presence across the metropolitan area. Further capital expenditure will be expected (funded by the profits from its own programs) to ensure that equipment supplies are maintained without the current requirement of sharing with WAVL and WAVJL teams.

The focus for WAVL and WAVJL will be to continue to provide opportunities to our member base that will attract high-quality players to the club. This will be via a combination of high-quality coaches and opportunities for talented young players to enter at State League and State League Reserves levels under the right guidance and support.

For the club to continue to grow, an increased focus will also be required on the number of committee members required as increased member numbers and kids/junior volley programs will continue to strain the current committee, combined with the increased workload and requirements of the two new entities being created.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Board has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity on the basis that, in the opinion of the Board, there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy, specifically, all of their information needs. Accordingly, this financial report is a special purpose financial report, which has been prepared to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA).

The financial report covers Western Australian Volleyball Association Inc. as an individual entity, which is registered and domiciled in Australia. The Association is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial report was approved by the Board as at the date of the Statement by Members of the Board.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the *Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA)*, the recognition and measurement requirements specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of:

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

(a) Basis of preparation of the financial report

Historical Cost Convention

The financial report has been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Significant accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of the financial report requires the use of certain estimates and judgements in applying the Association's accounting policies. Those estimates and judgements significant to the financial report are disclosed in Note 2: critical accounting estimates, judgements and assumptions to the financial statements.

Going Concern

As at 31 December 2022, the Association's current assets exceeded current liabilities by \$497,679.

The financial report has been prepared on the going concern basis. In arriving at the position the Board has had regard to the fact that, the Association has, or in the Board's opinion will have access to, sufficient cash to fund administrative and other committed expenditure for a period of at least 12 months from the date of signing this financial report (the "Period").

In forming this view, the Board has taken into consideration the following:

The Association receives a significant portion of its income from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries and Healthway, membership fees and competitions ("Significant Sources of Funding"). It is expected that the Significant Sources of Funding for the Period will be comparable to prior years which will enable the Association to pay all its liabilities and commitments as and when they fall due for at least 12 months from the date of approval of the financial report.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Should the Association not achieve the matters set out above there is significant uncertainty whether the Association will continue as a going concern and therefore whether it will realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities in the normal course of operations and at the amounts stated in the financial report. The financial report does not include any adjustment relating to the recoverability or classification of recorded asset amounts or to the amounts or classification of liabilities that might be necessary should the Association not be able to continue as a going concern.

(b) New and revised accounting standards and interpretations effective at 31 December 2022

The Association has applied all new and revised accounting standards and interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board that are relevant to the Association and effective for the current reporting period. There was no material impact of the new and revies accounting standards and interpretations on the Association and therefore, no material change in to accounting policies.

(c) Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures.

(d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and at banks, short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less held at call with financial institutions, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the asset and liabilities statement.

(e) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term employee benefit obligations

Liabilities arising in respect of wages and salaries, annual leave and other employee benefits (other than termination benefits) expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the reporting period are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts based on remuneration rates which are expected to be paid when the liability is settled. The expected cost of short-term employee benefits in the form of compensated absences such as annual leave is recognised in the provision for employee benefits. All other short-term employee benefit obligations are presented as payables in the asset and liabilities statement.

(ii) Long-term employee benefit obligations

The provision for other long-term employee benefits, including obligations for long service leave and annual leave, which are not expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the reporting period, are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflow to be made in respect of the services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee turnover, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that are denominated in the currency in which the benefits will be paid. Any remeasurements for changes in assumptions of obligations for other long-term employee benefits are recognised in the income and expenditure statement in the periods in which the change occurs.

Other long-term employee benefit obligations are presented as current liabilities in the asset and liabilities statement if the Association does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, regardless of when the actual settlement is expected to occur. All other long-term employee benefit obligations are presented as non-current liabilities in the asset and liabilities statement.

(f) Financial instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the Association commits itself to either the purchase or sale of the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified as fair value through profit or loss, in which case transaction costs are immediately recognised as expenses in the income and expenditure statement.

Classification of financial assets

Financial assets recognised by the Association are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, subject to their classification and whether the Association irrevocably designates the financial asset on initial recognition at fair value through other comprehensive income ("FVtOCI") in accordance with the relevant criteria in AASB 9 *Financial Instruments* ("AASB 9").

Financial assets not irrevocably designated on initial recognition at FVtOCI are classified as subsequently measured at amortised cost, FVtOCI or fair value through profit or loss ("FVtPL") on the basis of both:

- (a) the Association's business model for managing the financial assets; and
- (b) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

Trade and other receivables

Other than cash and cash equivalents, trade and other receivables are the most relevant financial asset to the Association and arise from the Association's transactions with its customers and are normally settled within 30 days.

Consistent with both the Association's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the assets, trade and other receivables are subsequently measured at amortised cost less any provision for expected credit loss.

Classification of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities classified as held-for-trading, contingent consideration payable by the Association for the acquisition of a business, and financial liabilities designated at FVtPL, are subsequently measured at fair value.

All other financial liabilities recognised by the Association are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the most relevant financial liability to the Association and are liabilities outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability (unless the Association has the unconditional right of deferral) with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(f) Financial instruments (Continued)

Derecognition

Financial Assets

The Association derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred or in which the Association neither transfers nor retains substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership and it does not retain control of the financial asset.

The Association enters into transactions whereby it transfers assets recognised in its assets and liabilities statement, but retains either all or substantially all of the risks and rewards of the transferred assets. In these cases, the transferred assets are not derecognised.

Financial Liabilities

The Association derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled, or expire. The Association also derecognises a financial liability when its terms are modified and the cash flows of the modified liability are substantially different, in which case a new financial liability based on the modified terms is recognised at fair value. On derecognition of a financial liability, the difference between the carrying amount extinguished and the consideration paid (including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed) is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the assets and liabilities statement when, and only when, the Association currently has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and it intends either to settle them on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Impairment

The Association recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on financial assets that are measured at amortised cost.

Expected credit losses are the probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of a financial instrument. A credit loss is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due and all cash flows expected to be received, all discounted at the original effective interest rate of the financial instrument.

Simplified approach

The Association uses the simplified approach to impairment, as applicable under AASB 9. The simplified approach does not require tracking of changes in credit risk at every reporting period, but instead requires the recognition of lifetime expected credit loss at all times. This approach is applicable to trade receivables.

In measuring the expected credit loss, a provision matrix for trade receivables is used, taking into consideration various data to get to an expected credit loss (i.e. diversity of its customer base, appropriate groupings of its historical loss experience, etc).

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(g) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and purchased assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the asset and liabilities statement are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(h) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Board has determined that the Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.*

(i) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and the costs necessary to make the sale. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

(j) Leases

At the commencement date of a lease (other than leases of 12-months or less and leases of low value assets), the Association recognises a lease asset representing its right to use the underlying asset and a lease liability representing its obligation to make lease payments.

Lease assets

Lease assets are initially recognised at cost, comprising the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date of the lease, less any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred by the Association, and an estimate of costs to be incurred by the Association in dismantling and removing the underlying asset, restoring the site on which it is located or restoring the underlying asset to the condition required by the terms and conditions of the lease, unless those costs are incurred to produce inventories.

Subsequent to initial recognition, lease assets are measured at cost (adjusted for any remeasurement of the associated lease liability), less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment loss.

Lease assets are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and the estimated useful life of the underlying asset, consistent with the estimated consumption of the economic benefits embodied in the underlying asset.

Lease liabilities

Lease liabilities are initially recognised at the present value of the future lease payments (i.e., the lease payments that are unpaid at the commencement date of the lease). These lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined, or otherwise using the Association's incremental borrowing rate.

(j) Leases (Continued)

Subsequent to initial recognition, lease liabilities are measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments (i.e., the lease payments that are unpaid at the reporting date). Interest expense on lease liabilities is recognised in income and expenditure (presented as a component of finance costs). Lease liabilities are remeasured to reflect changes to lease terms, changes to lease payments and any lease modifications not accounted for as separate leases.

Variable lease payments not included in the measurement of lease liabilities are recognised as an expense when incurred.

Leases of 12-months or less and leases of low value assets

Lease payments made in relation to leases of 12-months or less and leases of low value assets (for which a lease asset and a lease liability has not been recognised) are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis.

Leases at significantly below market terms and conditions

The Association leases its headquarters, 413 Bulwer Street, West Perth, from the City of Vincent (the "Lease"). The Lease includes significantly below market terms and conditions principally designed to enable the Association to further its objectives. The Association has elected to adopt an accounting policy to measure the Lease at cost at initial recognition, taking advantage of the exemption for not-for-profit organisations allowable within AASB 16 *Leases* with regards to measuring the right-of-use asset and lease liability at cost, rather than fair value.

(k) Revenue recognition

Membership subscription fees

Membership subscription fees are recognised as revenue when no significant uncertainty as to its collectability exists, if the fee relates only to membership and all other services or products are paid for separately, or if there is a separate annual subscription. Membership subscription fees are recognised on a basis that reflects the timing, nature and value of the benefit provided if the fee entitles the member to services or publications to be provided during the membership period, or to purchase goods or services at prices lower than those charged to non-members.

Event income

Revenue from organising and hosting events is recognised in the period in which the events are held.

Interest

Interest revenue is measured in accordance with the effective interest method.

Operating grant and sponsorship agreements

When the Association receives income from operating grant or sponsorship agreements (the "Agreement"), it assesses whether the Agreement is for the transfer of goods and services, is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers ("AASB 15"). When these conditions are met, the Association:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the Agreement;
- · recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the Agreement; and
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

(k) Revenue Recognition (Continued)

Where the Agreement is not for the transfer of goods and services, is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the Association:

- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards;
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer); and
- recognises income immediately in the income and expenditure statement as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when the control of the goods have passed to the buyer and the costs incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be measured reliably.

(I) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of plant and equipment is measured at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all other property, plant and equipment is depreciated over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held available for use, consistent with the estimated consumption of the economic benefits embodied in the asset.

Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset was held ready for use.

(m) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying values of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income and expenditure statement unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount in accordance with another standard. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease in accordance with that other standard.

(n) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period.

NOTE 2: CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES, JUDGEMENTS AND ASSUMPTIONS

The members of the Board evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the Association.

Key Estimates

Useful lives of depreciable assets

The Board reviews the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets to the Association. Actual results, however, may vary due to technical obsolescence, particularly relating to software and IT equipment.

Key judgments

Revenue and other income

The Association derives revenue and other income from a range of activities and sources, including revenue from the sale of goods and the provision of services, and income from operating grants and sponsorship agreements. In accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, the Association is required to determine whether it is appropriate to recognise revenue and other income in the financial year in which cash or non-cash assets are received or to defer the recognition of revenue and other income until associated obligations and/or conditions (if any) are satisfied. In making this judgement, the Association considers the guidance outlined in AASB 15 and AASB 1058 *Income of Not-for-Profit Entities* ("AASB 1058") and, in particular, whether the arrangement is for the transfer of goods and services and contains enforceable and sufficiently specific performance obligations. Where the Association identifies the existence of enforceable and sufficiently specific performance obligations, or the arrangement requires the Association to use the funds received to acquire or construct items of property, plant and equipment to identified specifications, the recognition of revenue and other income is deferred until the identified obligations are satisfied.
