


Renewing Your Accreditation

To maintain your refereeing accreditation, it is essential to engage in continuous professional development and earn Continuous Development Credits (CDCs). These credits are obtained by participating in various practical and self-learning activities designed to enhance your refereeing skills and knowledge.

Accreditation Renewal

Regular renewal of your accreditation is crucial to ensure that referees remain up to date with the latest rules, interpretations, and best practices in volleyball officiating. Accreditation **must be renewed every four years**, and the process involves completing specific professional development requirements and demonstrating ongoing competence in refereeing.

To renew your accreditation, you must attain a certain number of CDC points. In some cases, you can re-do your accreditation or achieve the next level of accreditation to refresh the renewal period.



Continuous Development Credits (CDCs)

Earning CDCs is a critical component of your professional development as a referee. These credits can be accumulated through a variety of activities.

A **maximum** of 50 CDC points can be claimed through Practical Officiating, with the rest coming from endorsed Self-Learning activities. Level 3 and 4 Referees must claim at least 25 points through VA National Events or International Events.


NOTE: All renewal activities cannot be completed in one year. They should ideally be spread over the accreditation period. At least 25 CDC points must be accumulated in the final year of the current accreditation period.

Submitting Your Renewal


To submit your accreditation renewal, you must ensure:

- CDC point activities are recorded and logged on the VA CDC Points Log Sheet.
- All other required activities are completed as per the online renewal form's Course Information (ex. Integrity modules or Sports Commission courses).
- All documentation is submitted on VA's Accreditation Portal and the renewal fee is paid.

What happens if the accreditation is not renewed?

Officials who do not complete the renewal requirements within the accreditation period will be removed from the Volleyball Australia Official Registry. You will be ineligible to officiate at VA and VWA programs and events.

What if the accreditation has expired?

If the accreditation has expired, individuals are required to redo the accreditation program or apply for a Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) or a Recognition of Current Competency (RCC). Special leave considerations (such as maternity leave, leave related to employment, etc.) are available and should be discussed with VWA.
